RUSSIA TOLD 'NO FLATS FOR THE OFFICERS'

THE Czechs have turned down a request by the Russians for 1,200 flats in Prague—for the officers of the occupation force.

The Soviet Army HQ has been told that there are no flats available, although the officers who will be

stationed on the Western border will be found "temporary" homes.

The Russian officers have been living in commandeered newspaper offices. But these are being handed back to the Czechs, leaving the officers with nowhere to sleep.

So the Russians have to make do with tents outside the capital.

Press censorship is now well established in Prague. Even a speech by leader Alexander Dubcek was censored in the party newspaper Rude Pravo yesterday.

He thanked factory workers in the capital for their support. But the newspaper omitted to say that he was thanking them for their help in organising the 14th Congress of the party which was held secretly after the Soviet invasion.

Biafra airlift hits new snag

PLANS by the Red Cross for a massive mercy airlift to Biafra have run into fresh snags.

An argument was still going on last night over where the Red Cross planes should land.

The first aircraft were due to take off yesterday from the Spanish island of Fernando Po off Nigeria to clear a stockpile of more than 3,000 tons of supplies.

But Red Cross sources said that the daylight flights, which were to last ten days, would be delayed at least twenty-four hours until the new difficulty was sorted out.

The Federal Nigerians agreed to the use of a Biafran airstrip at Uthiala for landing the supplies. Now the Bia-

frans are objecting to this because, it is understood, it is the only airstrip considered safe enough for the landing of weapons.

Mercy flights are still getting through to Biafra—by night.

At least four flights, carrying forty tons of supplies, were reported to have got through yesterday.

Yugoslavia's President Tito again criticised the Russian occupation of Czechoslovakia yesterday. He called for the rapid withdrawal of Warsaw Pact troops and said that the Czechs should have been left to solve their "problems" by themselves.

IN BERNE, Czech Foreign Minister Jiri Hajek, who has been in Switzerland, was said to be planning to return home.

VIETNAM BOY MEETS HIS NEW MUM

LITTLE Tran Van An rubbed his big brown eyes and smiled at the welcoming party at London's Heathrow Airport last night.

Then he got a special cuddle from his new mother, Mrs. Judith Nuttall, 25.

Lancs. was chosen from 1,200 volunteers to adopt the first Vietnam orphan brought to Britain by a Church organisation called Project Vietnam.

She gave her new 14-month-old baby a teddy bear and a toy poodle—presents from her two young children. One of

them, Peter, is only three months old. He and the newcomer will be christened together.

Mr. John Nuttall, a 45-year-old council official, proudly drove his new son home last night. "There are lots of friends and relatives waiting to meet him," he said.

Cut-price phones after midnight

TALKING at night is going to be cheaper for "big" telephone users, Mr. John Stonehouse, the Postmaster-General, announced yesterday.

Between midnight and six a.m., it will be possible to make unlimited phone calls anywhere in the United Kingdom for a fixed yearly charge.

The service—which Mr. Stonehouse calls the Midnight Line—is more likely to benefit industries such as newspapers and wholesale merchants than private subscribers.

The service, due to start in April, will also enable computer firms to transmit data more cheaply. Subscribers to the new service will rent a new telephone and number for use between midnight and 6 a.m. only.

List

The rental for the six hours will be about a third of the firm's usual nightly bill for long trunk calls.

Any user who makes more than two hours of long-distance calls a day will find the charge economical, said Mr. Stonehouse.

He envisaged that the newspaper industry would top the list of potential users.

He said the service would help computers "to go to bed with one another" while the rest of the world was asleep.

The Midnight Line could be brought in with "modest technical development," said Mr. Stonehouse.

THE RUNAWAY PANDA CAUGHT

RAMA, London Zoo's runaway red panda, was caught yesterday after four days of freedom.

Zoo keepers had tried everything to tempt Rama to leave his treetop refuge in Regent's Park.

They offered him all his favourite foods—apples, oranges and bananas—and even the sight of his recaptured mate, Suka, sitting in a cage at the foot of the tree.

Finally yesterday they decided on sterner measures. The top of the tree was sawn off. Rama was neatly caught in a net, and taken "home" to Suka and captivity.

Two teenaged brothers, Petroc and Enys Dan, of East Looe, Cornwall, yesterday won the fourth race in the Mirror Class Dinghy National Cup championships at Newquay, Cornwall.
